

BART Markup Language Tags – July 21, 2006

CONTENT

<id> . . . </id>	any proper name of a person
<job> . . . </job>	name of a profession
<\$> . . . </\$>	amount of money (mentioned within description)
<\$sub> . . . </\$sub>	subtotal of <..\$>
<..\$> . . . </..\$>	amount of money at end of paragraph (usually the same as <\$>)
<amt> . . . </amt>	actual amount (use this tag inside <\$> or <..\$> tags)
<cur> . . . </cur>	currency being used (use this tag inside <\$> or <..\$> tags)
<i>example:</i> la somme de <\$><amt>quinze liures</amt> <cur>de xl g [^] monn [^] de fland [^] la liure</cur></\$>	
<val> . . . </val>	value of a given weight in gold, silver, etc. (usually <i>marcs</i>)
<wage> . . . </wage>	indicates the rate of pay (no <\$> tags); e.g., so much per day
<from> . . . </from>	indicates where money came from
<for> . . . </for>	description of what money was for
<date> . . . </date>	date mentioned in text
<refdate>. . .</refdate>	date indicated as a reference point
<ou> . . . </ou>	any locations mentioned in text (cities, towns, regions, etc.)
<mon> . . . </mon>	monuments, churches, fountains, plazas, palaces, landmarks, etc.

LAYOUT

<file> . . . </file>	name of image file e.g., ADNB2017-041r.jpg. Should be the first element of each individual page.
<fol> . . . </fol>	folio number as it appears on the page – only if it appears on the page
<h1> . . . </h1>	main headline
<h2> . . . </h2>	secondary headline (use this for “vacat” pages)
<item> . . . </item>	any paragraph that is not a headline (</item> goes at end of paragraph)
<above> . . . </above>	text written above the line (e.g., between lines of text)
<below> . . . </below>	text written below the line
<super> . . . </super>	text superscripted
<xed> . . . </xed>	text crossed out
<lmargin> . . . </lmargin>	text written in left margin (associated with a paragraph: use inside same <item>)
<rmargin> . . . </rmargin>	text written in right margin (associated with a paragraph)
<tmargin> . . . </tmargin>	text written in top margin (associated with a paragraph)
<bmargin> . . . </bmargin>	text written in bottom margin (associated with a paragraph)
<lside> . . . </lside>	text in left margin (not associated with a paragraph—no <item> needed)
<rside> . . . </rside>	text in right margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<ltop> . . . </ltop>	text in top-left margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<ctop> . . . </ctop>	text in top-center margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<rtop> . . . </rtop>	text in top-right margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<lbottom> . . . </lbottom>	text in bottom-left margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<cbottom> . . . </cbottom>	text in bottom-center margin (not associated with a paragraph)
<rbottom> . . . </rbottom>	text in bottom-right margin (not associated with a paragraph)

<expand> . . . </expand>	expansion of abbreviation (not necessary for most common)
<??> . . . </??>	transcription is a guess or missing letters/words (even if you’re certain what’s missing)
<trans> . . . </trans>	English translation of word or phrase
<nb> . . . </nb>	Nota Bene: any additional note
<cto> . . . </cto>	<u>C</u> onsult <u>T</u> he <u>O</u> riginal: bad photo, fold in page, etc. Need to see the original to read
<. . . . >	dot - space - dot - space, etc. for each character not transcribed
<l l l l >	L - space - L - space, etc for each uninterpreted minim
